


Who I am

- Contacted by Infrastructure Canada in 2023 to develop a Canada-wide map

- Above all, it's an equity issue



What happened?

- Railway cuts in 1990 and 2012
- Bus industry consolidation and cutbacks
- Degradation of networks
- Rise of MegaBus
- Decline and fall of Greyhound abandoned Western Canada in 2018, Ontario & Quebec in 2020
- GO Transit expansion created new links but drew patronage from existing intercity carriers

Intercity buses can work, even in the North

- Private sector:
 Kasper Transportation in
 Northwestern Ontario
- Public sector:

 Ontario Northland in
 Northeastern Ontario
- Fills gap left by Greyhound's departure in 2018, while serving new routes



Regional services in Southern Ontario

- New municipal-led rural and interurban transit in Niagara, Waterloo, York, and Durham Regions, as well as Simcoe County
- Rural services in Greater Sudbury, Chatham-Kent, and Bay of Quinte region
- Intercommunity transit grants 2020 2025




Post-Greyhound

- Ontario Intercommunity
 Transportation Grants
 funded over a dozen new
 services in Southern
 Ontario those are coming
 to an end
- New private-sector intercity carriers: Onex Bus, Intercity Bus, Rider Express, Flixbus
- De-regulation allows for multiple operators on a single route



Map features

- Routes depicted by type and frequency (intercity, regional, etc.)
- Links to carriers' websites for detailed information and booking
- Major bus stops and terminals included
- Gaps are immediately apparent no bus service across the Quebec – New Brunswick border, for example

Challenges

- Trade-offs between community-led services and large network-based services
- Major gaps remain despite new services, especially in Western Canada




Challenges

- Need for sustainable, longterm support for intercity and rural transportation
- Collaboration between all levels of government and private-sector partners
- Central bookings, joint terminals, through-ticketing and scheduling

 Many routes, especially between smaller centres in Ontario, were operated by local operators


